ABOUT THIS RESOURCE

Summary of learning

The objectives of this pack are to give students a greater understanding about:

- What a cause is, how students can support a cause, what is meant by advocacy and how advocates can make an impact using famous people as examples;
- 2. Why art is an effective tool to use in campaigns, especially when addressing sensitive issues that are hard to talk about and how students can put this into action, using Mother & Child as an example;
- 3. What to consider when creating a piece of art to represent a cause and the feelings associated with it, including the use of symbolism;
- 4. Using wider art forms, such as dance, drawing, videos and music to raise awareness about important issues.

There may be some interesting art work to explore in your local area and this pack uses the Peace Gardens at Tavistock Square as an example.

Whilst this pack can be used as a complete education tool, each double page spread explores distinct themes and provides useful lessons individually.

Suitable for children aged 10 plus or in KS2 (year 6), KS3 or KS4 of secondary education.

CURRICULUM LINKS

This pack specifically meets the curriculum requirements to help pupils understand the themes listed below:

PSHE

This pack supports pupils in developing their research skills and their ability to use discussion in order to learn; give well-structured descriptions, explanations and narratives for different purposes, including expressing feelings.

SUPPORTING A CAUSE & ADVOCACY

This chapter introduces students to familiar causes, what it means to support them and how to get involved. Advocates and advocacy is explained, including examples of famous advocates, such as Greta Thunberg and Lady GaGa.

The activities in this chapter help students explore causes that are important to them, who has supported these causes and what individual students can do to make a difference. You may choose to support and advocate for a cause as a class or school using this pack as a starting point.

Pages 4-7

CAN ART HELP SUPPORT CAUSES

This chapter explores why art is a powerful tool in raising awareness about issues that are difficult to talk about and how it is useful in expressing emotions. Using well-known examples will help students understand the impact art can have on a cause's message, such as seen in the work of street artist and political activist Banksy.

Students may have their own examples of where artists, musicians or songwriters have used their art to advocate for change.

THE JUSTICE FOR LAI DAI HAN CAMPAIGN

The Justice for Lai Dai Han campaign is a good example of using art to support a cause. 'Mother & Child' is a sculpture used to celebrate the strength of women that have suffered abuse in conflicts and wars. Students can explore how the Mother & Child statue helps raise awareness about the campaign. CREATING MOTHER & CHILD

Using Mother & Child as an example, this chapter encourages students to create their own sculpture to show their feelings and emotions about something that is important to them.

THE POWER OF SYMBOLISM

This chapter explores how symbolism can be used to express ideas and feelings by showing instead of telling. Students are encouraged to look at how colour, pattern, shape and objects can be used as symbols.

OTHER SCULPTURES USED IN CAMPAIGNS

This chapter includes examples of some other well-known statues that have been used in different campaigns, such as the sculpture of Jen Reid to help raise awareness about racial injustice. Looking at local examples might be useful too.

Pages 16-17

FROM IDEAS TO ART

This chapter takes students on a journey from thinking of a cause that's important to them, understanding the heart of the cause, exploring emotions associated with it, and deciding which art form is best to convey the message and feelings. Any art form can be used, such as dance, videos, songs and drawings.
